NCTWS BOARD MEETING MINUTES

04-02-2002 - Southern Pines, NC - 11:10am: Meeting called to order by Pete Campbell Board members present for this meeting: Pete Campbell, Gary Marshall, Joe Fuller, Pat Farrell. Also present: Mike Willaford from NCSU.

A brief discussion about the location of future board meeting sites for 2002 resulted in the need to find a meeting site in the western section of NC for July 9, 2002, and the possibility of meeting in the Raleigh area for the Sept. 17, 2002 meeting. Pete Campbell will look into a site for the Sept. 17 meeting (possibly at the USDA Wildlife Services office) and Mark Johns will check with the Forsyth County Ag. Center as a possibility for the July 9 meeting.

<u>Minutes</u> from Feb. 28, 2002 board meeting were presented and reviewed by Secretary Mark Johns. Motion was made by Joe Fuller to accept the minutes as presented and seconded by Pat Farrel.

<u>Treasurer report</u> was given by Pat Farrell, outlining the expenditures and deposits since the annual meeting. Balance as of 3/26/02 in Checking is \$2,643.01. After review, a motion was made by Gary Marshall to accept the report, and this was seconded by Mark Johns. Pat Farrell also presented a copy of the annual tax report form for 2001 he had sent in that was requested by the TWS national office. Pat will be sending off a request for a \$100.00 reimbursement related to expenditures for start-up of the COWCH Program to the SE Chapter of TWS. Chris Moorman had made a request at the Feb. 28 annual meeting for a new order of brochures from TWS: 'A Wildlife Conservation Career for You' and after discussion the board recommended that Pat Farrell order 500 at an approximate coast of \$75.00 so members can distribute them as needed.

Old Business

It was noted that Chris Moorman has the rest of the supply of NCTWS brochures and it was suggested that he keep other board members supplied as needed.

NC Chapter sponsorship of the 2002 National TWS conference had been requested and the board discussed the amount to donate. Based on the past, Gary Marshall recommended a donation of \$100.00 and Pete Campbell made a motion to indeed make this donation to the 2002 National TWS meeting, and this motion was seconded by Joe Fuller. Pat Farrell will handle sending out the check.

Pat Farrell will handle getting \$800.00 (as requested by Ann Hice) to support Ann Hice's travel related to Russian Exchange

A discussion related to developing a sub-committee to evaluate funding requests from the membership, and develop some type of criteria for evaluation before being presented to the board was held. It was decided to actually put this task under the Awards Committee. Pete Campbell will further discuss this issue with Dave Dudek, the Awards Committee Chair.

A discussion was held relating to creating a new standing committee (Resolution/Public Statement) that would explore how to present information to the board for consideration that has been reviewed by the Conservation Review Committee. This discussion will continue at future board meetings.

New Business

The idea of holding a joint annual meeting with Virginia TWS for late Feb.- early March 2003 in the coastal plain was discussed. This would be a North Carolina TWS annual meeting with Virginia invited to participate. Pete Campbell will continue to recruit a person to head up the Program Committee. A discussion was held related to a theme for the next annual meeting. Two ideas proposed included presentations related to ongoing projects by TWS members from Virginia and NC and presentations related to management of problem species like resident Canada Geese, Snow Geese, beaver, Mute Swan, etc. Pat Farrell requested board discussion on the continued \$100.00 difference in the NCTWS account balance unresolved from a previous audit, and suggestions on appropriate action. It was suggested that if he can't find the error, he document a \$100.00 shortage in checking with an audit correction letter for the files.

NCSU

The Fisheries and Wildlife Sciences Program will graduate 16 students on May 18 and another 3 students this summer. The outstanding GPA graduate is **Sandy Edmonston**, who coop'ed with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and will join the National Wildlife Refuge System in Florida immediately after graduation. **Salinda Daley** has completed her MS in Fisheries and Wildlife Sciences. Her thesis title is "Examining landowner attitudes and behavior towards private land wildlife management in North Carolina." **Pete Bromley** and **David Cobb** co-chaired her committee. **Randy Outward** completed his MS in Entomology. His thesis is "Effects of vegetated field borders on arthropods in cotton and soybean

fields in eastern North Carolina." **Clyde Sorenson** chaired Outward's committee and **Phil Doerr** and **Pete Bromley** were committee members. Both Daley and Outward worked on the Wildlife-Agriculture Applied Research Team and both contributed critical information to help guide the NCWRC CURE program.

MECKLENBURG COUNTY

Several bird data collection projects are underway this spring and breeding season in Mecklenburg County. Point counts are being conducted at 4 nature preserves. Highlights have included many species of migrating warblers and Kentucky Warbler and Prothonotary Warbler nests, found next to two points. The M.A.P.S. station at Cowan's Ford Wildlife Refuge is in its fourth year of operation. New species have included Canada Warbler, Black-throated Blue Warbler and Sharp-shinned Hawk - all believed to be late migrants. Grassland/shrubland nest success data collection continues at the McDowell Grassland Expansion site. Over 100 nests have already been documented on site this season. Over 200 nest boxes are installed as part of our county-wide nestbox program. Nest box monitoring efforts for this year have focussed on owl nests (in conjunction with two researchers), Brown-headed Nuthatch boxes and Prothonotary Warbler boxes. Data is also being collected on the nesting success of the last remaining colony of Yellow-crowned Night-herons in Charlotte, as well as the rapid expansion of Great Blue Heron nesting colonies throughout the area.

Take A Look: Check out the first of two research articles on Loggerhead Shrikes, by Jeff Esely, DNR Conservation Science Specialist. This article is titled "Habitat selection and reproductive success of Loggerhead Shrikes in northwest Missouri: A hierarchial approach." It can be found in the most recent issue of the Wilson Bulletin (Vol. 113 (3), 2001. Pp. 290-296). A second Shrike article is due out in the next issue.

HAYWOOD COMMUNITY COLLEGE

The HCC Outdoor Club competed in the 2002 Southeastern Wildlife Conclave held 21- 23 March in western Kentucky. This year's host was Murray State University and the event was held at Lake Barkley State Resort Park. Twenty-one HCC Fish and Wildlife Management students participated including Travis Beard, Daniel Bell, Josh Brooks, Nathan Green, Jo Hammett, Melanie Handford, Rock Hilton, Matthew Holbrook, B.J. Keener, Nick McCracken, Jordan Miller, Richard Mosteller, Barry Oldham, Seth Palmer, Leonard Perkey, Robert Price, Dustyn Reece, Billy Rogers, Nick Shaver, Jake Taylor, and Shenan Thompson. Instructors Rick Lindsay, Dave Dudek and Shannon Rabby were also in attendance.

The Outdoor Club, as a Student Chapter of The Wildlife Chapter, competed against student chapters from 17 universities from across the southeast including University of Georgia, Arkansas State University, Arkansas Tech University, University of Tennessee Martin, University of Tennessee Knoxville, N.C. State University, Louisiana Tech University, University of Florida, Oklahoma State University, Arkansas Tech University, Tennessee Tech University, Stephen F. Austin State University, Frostberg State University, Mississippi State University, Louisiana State University, Eastern Kentucky University, and Auburn University. University teams included undergraduate and graduate students in fish and wildlife management curricula.

Competition categories included Individual Creative/Talent (essay, art, photography, game calling), Individual Field (obstacle course, archery, kayak, dendrology, orienteering, trap shoot), Team Field (wildlife population estimation, identification of wildlife sign-plants-trees-birds-frogs (including song)-skulls, animal taxonomy, etc.), The most heavily weighted competition each year is an Academic Quiz Bowl involving 4-student teams from each school in a double elimination tournament. Questions are drawn from a broad variety of subjects, such as, general biology, genetics, wildlife management, wildlife techniques, and all related fields.

Our HCC Team earned FIRST PLACE in the Academic Quiz Bowl. The Quiz Bowl Team members were Nick McCracken, Nick Shaver, Shenan Thompson, and Robert Price. The team was recognized at the Awards Banquet and presented with individual plaques a signed/numbered/framed art print and the coveted Quiz Bowl Trophy (UT Knoxville took second in Quiz Bowl and first Overall with help from one of HCC's graduates, Jason Burke, who is now a first semester UT student). We also received Second Place Overall due to scores received in all competition categories. Additional awards received included First Place Archery with a perfect score by Jordan Miller, Second Place Obstacle Course by Seth Palmer, Dustyn Reece, Josh Brooks, and Rock Hilton (with less than one second time difference with the first place UT team), and Third Place Photography by Melanie Handford.

The conclave was truly an outstanding experience for our students. In addition to the competitive success, our students also gained hands-on experience through participating in various field trips (elk reintroduction, fresh water mussel industry, wildlife forensics, herpetology, paddlefish gill netting).

Finally the Outdoor Club would like to express sincere appreciation for support received from our college community. Thanks to all who donated toward the raffle for the hammer dulcimer; thanks also to Michael Ransburg who donated his time and skill to craft this beautiful instrument. Shannon Rabby, a Fish and Wildlife graduate and part-time HCC biology lab instructor also deserves to be recognized for his efforts in coaching our Quiz Bowl Team.
